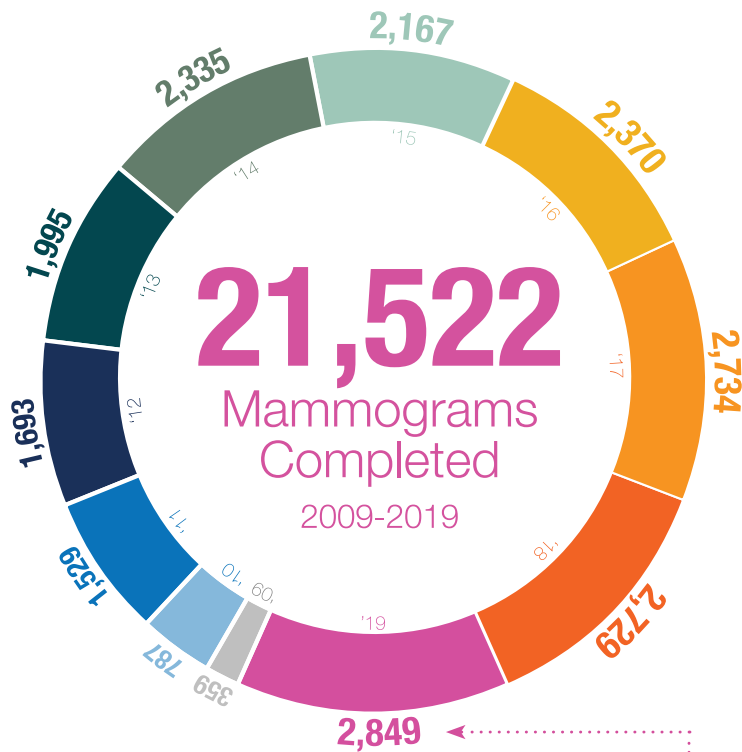

The Bonnie's Bus Mobile Mammography Program is a partnership between the WVU Cancer Institute and WVU Medicine that began in 2009. Bonnie's Bus has provided more than 21,500 screening mammograms and found more than 110 cases of breast cancer.

Bonnie's Story

Bonnie's Bus was established by a donation from Ben and Jo Statler to honor Jo's mother, Bonnie Wells Wilson, who lived in a rural area of West Virginia with no access to screening mammography and died of breast cancer in 1992. Jo wanted to ensure that all West Virginia women have access to life-saving screening mammograms for early detection of breast cancer.

Beyond Breast Cancer

In a state where travel to medical facilities presents barriers to care, Bonnie's Bus works to promote overall health and reduce barriers to services beyond breast cancer. Some examples include:

- Giving flu shots at mammogram appointments
- Offering FIT (Fecal Immunochemical Test) kits for colorectal cancer screening
- Participating in a colorectal cancer blood test clinical trial

20,000 Mammograms!

Bonnie's Bus performed its 20,000th screening mammogram on August 2 during a visit to the Mineral County Health Department in Keyser, WV. This milestone highlights the importance of this service to so many women across the state.

"We are extremely proud to offer a program that has served so many patients across the state. It is humbling

to think that many of these patients would not be able to have this screening without our program." Jenny Ostien, director of mobile screening, said.
